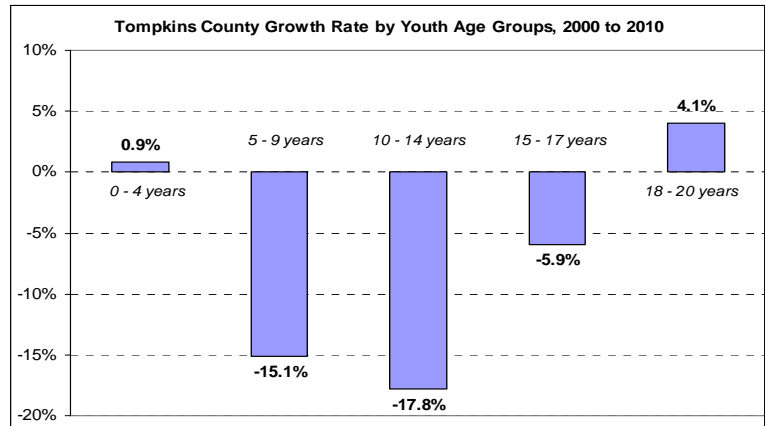

Tompkins County's 0-17 and 0-20 youth population shrank from 2000 to 2010. Only Danby and T. Ithaca showed increases for 0-17, all other towns have fewer youth than in 2000. Only age groups 0-4 and 18-20 are larger than they were in 2000. Age group 10-14 had the largest decrease, nearly 18%.

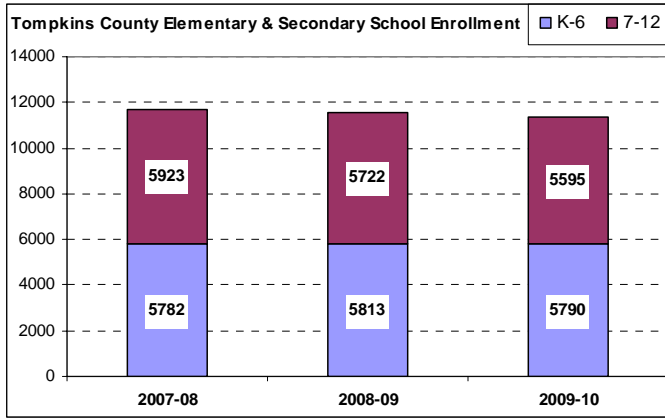

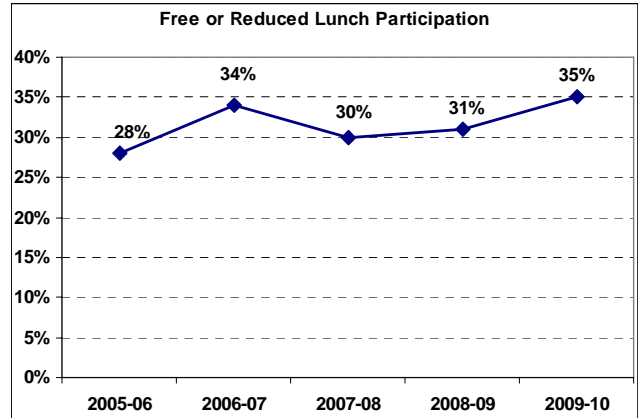

*A Person in Need of Supervision (PINS) is a youth under the age of eighteen who is showing a pattern of habitual disobedience, running away, curfew violations, substance abuse, violent behavior, or school truancy problems. PRE-PINS works to make early identification of youth that exhibit PINS-like behaviors before those behaviors become ingrained and fixed. The program is short-term, usually four to eight weeks, and is geared toward diverting youth from a referral to the more formal PINS Diversion Program.

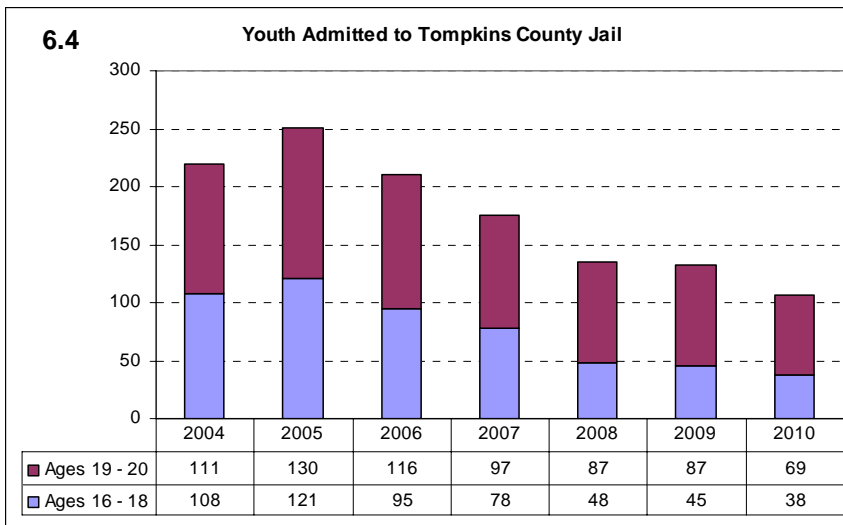

PINS Diversion Services attempt to resolve the conflicts that brought a youth to the attention of the Probation Department by offering supervision, guidance, and referrals to community resources, thus preventing the need for formal Family Court intervention. PINS Diversion is a mandatory prerequisite prior to filing a formal PINS petition in Family Court.

* A Juvenile Delinquent is defined as a person over seven and less than sixteen years of age, who commits an act, which, if committed by an adult, would constitute a crime. The crimes include a wide range of offenses such as Assault, Burglary, Criminal Possession of Stolen Property, Criminal Mischief, Falsely Reporting an Incident, Criminal Possession of a Weapon, Menacing and Petit Larceny. Tompkins County Probation Dept. provides diversion services to youth issued a Juvenile Appearance Ticket by local police agencies.
